EARLY LIFE AT PAINTED WOODS JEWISH SETTLEMENT

Maxie R. Clark Davis, born in February 1885 in North Dakota, was the third child of Mrs. Herman and Louis Louis "Big" Davis, who had emigrated from Russia in 1882. The Davises were part of the Painted Woods Settlement in Bismarck, North Dakota, an early Jewish Jewish farming community established in 1885. The settlement, along with others in the Midwest, was founded by Russian Jews who were forbidden from owning land in the United States and sought new opportunities in agriculture. Encouraged by the Homestead Colony together with 20 families and grown to 54 families by the end of 1885.

However, the settlers faced numerous challenges, including prairie fires, droughts, crop failures, diseases, and heavy conditions that led many to leave after working the land for the minimum required years. By 1887, only 40 settlers remained, and most eventually returned to traditional work in market towns along the growing railroad system.

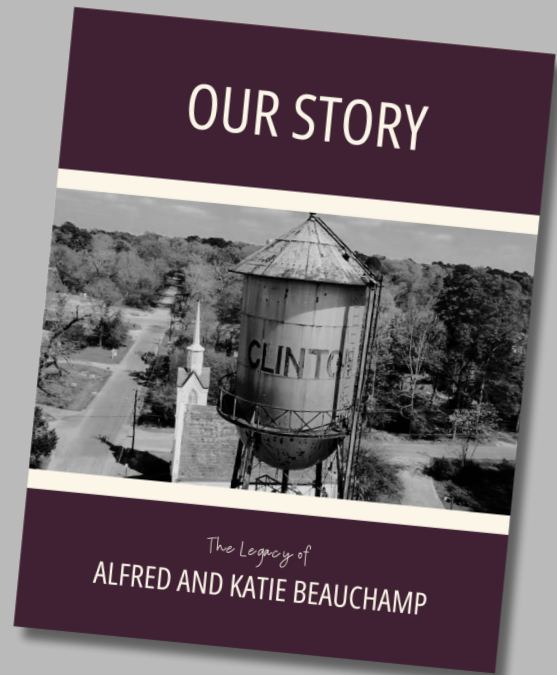
